

## SEIZE OWNER OF TRUCK IN WHICH BLAST KILLED 2

Harrisburg, Ill., Oct. 17.—[U.P.]—Mark Wanless, 37, repair shop proprietor and owner of the small motor truck in which an infernal machine was placed last Sept. 22, causing the death of two youths who had borrowed the machine, was arrested today on murder charges.

State's Attorney D. F. Rumsey filed the charges against Wanless, after an investigation into the hitherto baffling case, but declined to say what the basis was for the arrest. Wanless stoutly denied he had any knowledge of the crime.

Albert and T. S. Farmer Jr., cousins, were killed when the truck exploded a few hours after they borrowed it from Wanless to visit a farm.

Wanless' brother-in-law, Harvey Thompson, was arrested for questioning the day of the bombing, on reports he had threatened Wanless because the repair shop owner allegedly beat his wife, Thompson's sister, a week previously, causing such injuries that she was taken to a hospital. Thompson was later released.

## Student Guidance Centers Needed, Principal Asserts

## Trial of Col. Luke Lea for Conspiracy Is Delayed

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 17.—(AP)—Trial of Col. Luke Lea, Tennessee publisher and politician, on charges of conspiracy was postponed today from Oct. 26 to Jan. 11, 1932, at the request of defense counsel. Lea and his son were indicted here last August on charges of conspiring to defraud the Liberty Bank and Trust company of Nashville of \$150,000.

## Bandit Is Trailed by Victim and Captured

A robber presented his pistol and took \$35 from Louis Dan, manager, in the Bedford shirt store at 23 North Clark street yesterday. When he walked out Dan followed him. At Dearborn and Madison streets the manager enlisted the help of Policeman Edward Gall, who arrested the bandit. He said he was Paul Carter, 43 years old, and that he turned robber to get enough money for food and a bed.
